Year 6 Transition Visits

2017 was their first year of Transition. Seven years later and we prepare to farewell our Year 6 students, as they spread their wings and begin new adventures at High School. It is important to keep in mind that your child may experience an onset of emotions ranging from...

I'm so excited! >>> I'm a little nervous >>> I'm worried I'll have no friends >>> How do I make new friends? >>> Will I be on time to my classes? >>> Where do I eat recess and lunch? How will I keep up with homework?

Learningpotential.gov.au recommends these tips when preparing your child for High School.

Show enthusiasm

Start talking about high school with your child throughout the year leading up to the start of high school. Be positive and discuss the things about going to high school that you know they will be interested in—it could be an opportunity to try out for a school band, or to engage in experiments in science. Discuss the subjects they might learn and the friends they might meet.

> Listen and acknowledge their concerns

Discuss with your child what they think going to high school will be like. What do they think their classes will be like? What are they most looking forward to? How many kids do they know from their primary school who will be going to their high school? Listening to your child talk may give you some indication of their concerns. If they have concerns, let your child know that you take them seriously, and together work out ways to address them.

Get your child use to their new school

If you can, drive or walk past the high school your child will attend occasionally, and comment on it. For instance, you might talk about the nice garden or the fact that it has a basketball court. This will familiarise your child with the school. Most high schools hold an orientation day to help new students and their parents become familiar with the school. This may include a school tour, meeting fellow students and teachers, and taking part in special lessons and activities. This is a great opportunity for your child to get to know their new school.

Introduce or enhance student routines

Prepare your child for the likely increase in homework by establishing study routines and preparing a study area free from distractions.

> Begin or increase focus on time management

Help your child to start scheduling their study and extracurricular activities on a calendar or wall planner, so they appreciate the power of time management.

As part of their preparation for High School we offer familiarisation opportunities to our Year 6 students. Today our Year 6 students participated in a transition to High School excursion at Centralian Middle School (CMS). Students are given the opportunity to explore their new surroundings and familiarise themselves with prospective teachers and classrooms.

Although this morning's weather suggests otherwise, Spring has sprung! The chilly mornings are slowing fading as we begin to pack away our winter clothes. Please remember with these warmer days ahead of us to 'Slip Slop Slap', wear your hat and drink lots of water. In April, Miss Barnes put a call out to the Year 5 and 6 teachers for some students who love to read. The selected students needed to be able to devour multiple books, have critical conversations and conduct presentations for creative responses. These students were to become our 2023 Shadow Judges for the CBCA (Children's Book Council Australia) book of the year awards.

The selected students were given 6 very special books to read written by Australian authors. These books were shortlisted by the CBCA, all in the running to win book of the year. The students had the immense job of reading, reviewing and judging each book.

Isbel, Harry, Alex, June, Jordan, Debra and Elea were selected by their teachers to join the program. They met with Miss Barnes and Author Renee McBryde every Friday for one hour to review and examine each book. They engaged in robust conversations and were each brave enough to offer their insightful thoughts and feelings regarding each book. In August, the CBCA invited the students to the Town Library to creatively present one book from the shortlist. Students planned, prepared and practised their presentations and delivered them to a very grateful audience.

The final task for the Shadow Judges was to make a decision regarding which of the 6 books they felt should be the overall winner for the People's Choice Award. After many sleepless nights and much deliberation, the group selected *Runt* by David Silvey as their winner.

Last week, the CBCA announced the overall winner for book of the year. Funnily enough, the book awarded this prestigious title was *Runt*. This goes to show what incredible Shadow Judges we had because they too agreed with the professionals. The CBCA also announced the winner for the People's Choice Award, this went to *August and Jones* by Pip Harry.

Both *Runt* and *August and Jones* are now available in our Library ready for students to borrow. We also have multiple copies of each of the 6 selected shortlisted books ready for teachers to dive into. Ollie - "My favourite was the Gustav Klimt one because it was fun playing around with shapes."

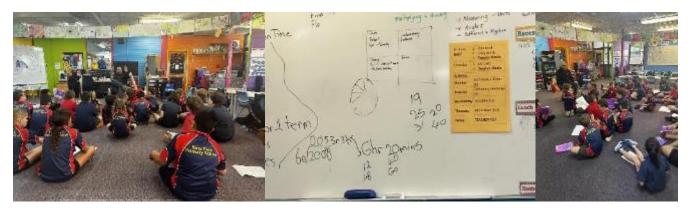
Debra – "I liked doing the Picasso art because we used different colours and everyone's designs were unique but similar."

Parent Contributions at Ross Park PARENTS + TEACHERS SUCCESSFUL KIDS

A Friendly reminder that if you have not already paid your Parent Contribution then they are now due.

According to our Family Handbook, "the parent contribution for Ross Park for 2023 is \$100.00 per child, per year. This voluntary contribution pays for, among other things, attendance at performances or workshops, class electives, subscriptions and licenses, interschool sports fees and whole school special activities. Parents are encouraged to make the contribution by the end of Term 1. Please feel free to speak to our office staff if you are experiencing difficulties in making this donation. Contributions can be made at \$25.00 per term and EFTPOS is available."

Parent Contributions also pay for most of the consumable items used in classrooms, including paints, paper, pencils, books (etc), and all photocopying of activities that are used within the classroom. As mentioned above, it goes towards subscriptions such as Reading Eggs and Mathletics, that students access regularly.

At the beginning of the year, we prepare a budget with an estimation of how much money we will receive from parent contributions and then allocate this to certain budget lines. This year we are well down on Parent Contributions, with less than half of the students enrolled in the primary school making this payment. Whilst we absolutely acknowledge that money is tight across the board, and that this payment is 'voluntary', we are hoping that we can raise the current level as we head into Semester 2.

Currently approximately 180 of our 400 students have made this contribution, and it may mean that we will have to reduce some of the programs on offer at the school in Semester 2, if we cannot raise this level.

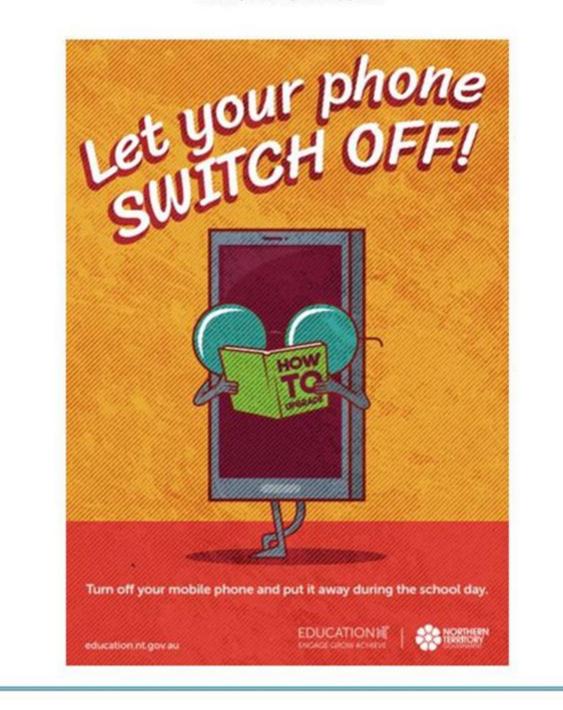
