From the leadership team

NTLC

The Northern Territory Learning Commission (NTLC) is a collaborative initiative providing an opportunity for students to grow their agency through analysing their school's data, coplanning and co-implementing a project with the goal of improving learning at their school. Student voice plays an important role in co-decision making within a school that can positively impact their learning, but also that of others.

Selected Year 5 and 6 students represented Ross Park with Miss Hogan, Ms. Hawker and Mr. Adami at the Northern Territory Learning Commission conference in Darwin this week. The NTLC is a territory wide organisation that allows our young leaders to collaborate and co-lead change and growth with their peers and teachers within their school. They become agents of our school which provides opportunities to set a goal, reflect and act responsibly to effect change. It is about acting rather than being acted upon; shaping rather than being shaped; and making responsible decisions and choices rather than accepting those determined by others." (OECD, 2019, p.2)

Agency can be thought of occurring in degrees that range from silence to that of shared decision making with adults (Hart, 1992; OECD, 2019; State of Victoria (Department of Education and Training), 2019). There are considered to be eight levels of young people's participation in activities and decision making: young people initiating and sharing discussions with adults; young people initiating and directing projects with adult support; shared decision making; adult led projects with student input; assigned projects with adult informing participation type; tokenism; decoration; manipulation; and silence.

Growing student agency can help individuals overcome adversity (Talreja, 2017).

Our Ross Park students had an enriching experience up in Darwin learning about themselves and from others. They showcased their school-based project to other Northern Territory schools to exhibit what they had learnt from their NTLC experience. They met with other NTLC schools in the Territory and participated in a Northern Territory (NT) school EXPO where all participating schools set up a booth and showcased their NTLC projects. Ross Park students had an opportunity to visit other school booths and share learning experiences with students from other NT regions.

Minster Eva Lawler made a guest appearance at the conference. She presented and discussed the importance of student voice and the impact it can have to inspiring our young leaders. After a busy day conferencing they met up with fellow commissioners from Alice Springs School of the Air at the Darwin Lagoon and enjoyed themselves at the waterpark.

A massive thank you to Ms Hawker, Miss Hogan and Mr Adami for accompanying and caring for our students during their stay in Darwin and for their ongoing support in co-leading our 2023 NTLC project. We are so lucky to have teachers who constantly inspire our students to drive ideas and build enriching learning experiences.

Always eager to explore new books, our students' love for reading is evident as 93 students enthusiastically participated in the Chief Minister's Reading Challenge. A special award ceremony was held at the Town Council and hosted by the Alice Springs Library last week. This included canapes, a live feed from the Parliament House Darwin ceremony and the Deputy Mayor presenting awards. Four randomly selected students who had completed the challenge attended as representatives of Ross Park Primary School.

The Chief Minister's Reading Challenge encourages students to read more books for pleasure. Every student from Transition to Year 6 in the Northern Territory was set the task to read 12 books in 24 weeks. Ross Park had 93 ardent readers complete the challenge. This was an increase from 25 students in 2022. How many students will participate in 2024?

"I was excited and I loved the cheese" – Chloe, Year 4.

"I was nervous, but it was relaxing and I ate very good Kiwi fruit" – Caleb, Year 4.

"We represented Ross Park. I was excited because I never win anything" - Jameson, Year 3.

When asked about next year's challenge:

"Ross Park had 93 children finish the challenge, but some schools had over 200! We can make it more fun, you can read audio books while you're doing things and visit the library a bit more so we can get over 200 finishing the challenge" – Caleb and Chloe, Year 4.


