It's crucial to exercise caution, as there have been a few instances where snakes have been spotted in neighbouring streets, potentially in close proximity to your residences.

Today our Year 4 students embarked on a journey to the local community garden. Here, they delved into the intricacies of our local ecosystem, gaining invaluable hands-on experience in understanding the roles of producers, consumers and decomposers within it. Such excursions serve as vital supplements to classroom learning, providing our students with real-world contexts to deepen their understanding of the curriculum.

We extend our thanks to the incredible families who generously volunteer their time to accompany our students on these enriching excursions across all year levels. Your support plays a pivotal role in ensuring the success and safety of these outings. 

Dear Ross Park Families,

As we move into the second half of Term 1, we are noticing quite a few lunchboxes with very limited healthy options for students. A healthy and nutritious lunchbox is vital for learning success at school. High amounts of sugary foods or foods with lots of preservatives, can often result in negative impacts on learning and concentration throughout the day. Healthy grains, protein and fruit/vegetables are best to sustain engagement in learning and provide appropriate energy levels throughout the day. At Ross Park we encourage children to eat:

- * Brain Food around 9-9:30am usually fruit or vegetables
- * Main Food at 10:50 am sandwiches, pasta, cheese and crackers, eggs, salads etc. This gives us lots of energy and concentration for the second half of the day.
- * Snacks or extra lunch items at 1:10pm giving us a nice calm and full belly for the afternoon session. Students are never prevented from eating their food in the order they wish to, however, we aim to support their learning about how best to deliver the nutrients their bodies need to learn most effectively.


We encourage all students to save any sugar only treats for afterschool, or weekends.



Important information for Transition to Year 2 Classes




